Large Trees (over 12 metres)							
	Sugar Maple (<i>Acer saccharum</i>)	Up to 35m	Leaves turn yellow, brilliant orange or red	Can tolerate shade but grows better when it gets full sun	Prefers moist soil	Likes a well-drained, moderately moist, and fertile soil.	Its roots are deep and wide spreading, and it's a large and strong tree, ideal for use as a shade tree. One should not plant this tree in confined areas or where salt is a problem
	Bur Oak (<i>Quercus macrocarpa</i>)	12-18m	Bronze-tan	Full Sun, Partial Shade	Average to moist	Grows in a variety of soils	Resistant to oak wilt. Is the larval host of Edwards Hairstreak and Horace's Duskywing butterfly.
MEDIUM TREES (average 7.5-12 metres)							
	Hackberry (<i>Celtis occidentalis</i>)	9 to 15m	Yellow	Full Sun, Partial Shade	Average to moist	Adaptable to all types and wide pH range	Among the best food and shelter sources for wildlife. Birds love the fruit.
	Ironwood (<i>Ostrya virginiana</i>)	Up to 12m	Yellow	Very shade tolerant, full sun with ample moisture	Dry to moist	Prefers well-drained, slightly acidic soils	Resistant to insects (except the gypsy moth), disease, wind, ice, and most stresses of urban living. One of the toughest native woods.

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SMALL TREES and SHRUBS (average of 7.5 metres)							
	Northern Bush Honey-suckle (<i>Diervilla lonicera</i>)	Less than 1 metre	Foliage turns yellow-orange, then red to purple	Full Sun, Partial, Shade	Dry to moist	Tolerant of a range of soils and pH levels	The fruit capsules are desirable to many song-birds, autumn through winter.
	Nanny Berry (<i>Viburnum lentago</i>)	4-5 metres	Flowers give way in autumn to blue-black, berry-like drupes	Full sun to part shade	Moist	Loam, Clay	Prune immediately after flowering since flower buds form in summer for the following year. Berry-like drupes which often persist into winter and are quite attractive to birds and wildlife.
	White Cedar (<i>Thuja occidentalis</i>)	Up to 9 metres	Winter interest	Full sun to part shade	Moist	Grows in a variety of soils, but does not tolerate road salt	NOTE: MUST prune to keep it shrub size
	Smooth Serviceberry (<i>Amelanchier laevis</i>)	2-10 metres	Orange-red	Full Sun, Partial Shade	Any	Tolerant of a somewhat wide range of soils, but prefers moist, well-drained loam	Fruit are sweet and juicy used to make jams and pies. Are rich in iron and copper.
